He was appointed their international head coach in 2014 before moving to manage Crawley in League Two in 2016. Before becoming manager of Ware he made 50 appearances for the club.

**First player to reach one hundred appearances:**

Edmund Pearce on February 19<sup>th</sup>, 1898 at home to Clove, a 3-0 win. Pearce was also the first to two and three hundred appearances.

**Family ties:**

The Chapman brothers C, B and F formed the complete half back line in the Herts Charity Cup match against Hailey Rovers on September 24<sup>th</sup> 1910 and again in the following week's Herts County League match with Hatfield United.

**Longest run of appearances:**

125 by Horst Breiting.<sup>13</sup> The run commenced on 8<sup>th</sup> September 1951 in the 4-1 home defeat to Hatfield Town in the Spartan League Division One (Horst scored our goal). It ended on 26<sup>th</sup> April 1954 in another home defeat this time 3-2 to Tufnell Park Edmonton in the Spartan League Premier Division.

This record was originally noted as 122 but during this period Horst also appeared in three games that were abandoned. All three abandonments occurred in the second half of the games, one as late as the 83<sup>rd</sup> minute. Given that any player starting a match in the era of substitutions may well be withdrawn from the game after much less time but still have the appearance credited to their record it seems reasonable to add these games to Horst's record.

The 122 completed games ended with 88 wins for Ware and 23 defeats with goals for (including those in the abandoned games) coming to 419 and against totalling 202.

**Most appearances in one season:**

Paul Messer – 52 games out of 55 played in 1965/6 before the advent of floodlights. In the era of substitutes Paul Burton appears in 62 competitive games out of the 64 played in 2007/8

<sup>13</sup> Horst Breiting served with the Afrika Korps in WWII and was captured in 1942. He was held in a prison camp in the US before coming to Britain after the war. He didn't want to return to his home town in what was by then East Germany and gained permission to stay in Britain where he made his home.

**National recognition whilst with Ware:**

Bernard Catling - played in the South vs North trial match for the England amateur side on 10<sup>th</sup> February 1908. Match drawn 1-1.

Luke Woods - selected for the Malta Under-21 side for matches against Bosnia-Herzegovina (twice), Wales and France in 2007.

Mackye Townsend-West – Played for Montserrat in the Concacaf Nations League 2024.

**Youngest player:**

Danny Gibbs - 15 years and 329 days when he made his debut as a substitute in the 3-0 Herts Senior Cup defeat at Cheshunt on 2<sup>nd</sup> November 1999.

Ethan Gannon - 16 years and 26 days when he played in goal for the full ninety minutes in a drawn Isthmian League Cup group game at Histon on 24<sup>th</sup> September 2019 and was 16 years and 44 days when keeping goal for a full Isthmian League win by 3-1 at Bedfont Sports on 19<sup>th</sup> October 2019.

Cameron Currie - 16 years and 229 days when he played outfield for the full ninety minutes in a Southern League Cup 2-2 draw against Northwood on 13<sup>th</sup> October 2015.

**Youngest scorers:**

Sonny Silenti - 16 years and 34 days when he scored in the 2-1 defeat at Redbridge on 24<sup>th</sup> March 2012.

Danny Gibbs - 16 years and 148 days when he scored twice in the 5-2 home win over Kingsbury on 4<sup>th</sup> May 2000.

George Dearman also scored in fifteen consecutive matches (a record for the club) covering the end of the 1925/6 season and the beginning of the next. The total of goals in this run was 34 making an average of over two a game. His record may be longer (18 games) as the scorers in the match preceding this run were not recorded.

Harry Blakes was another who scored in fifteen consecutive matches in the 1899/1900 season scoring 33 goals. Like Dearman's record, Blakes' is also potentially longer (though only by one game) because the scorers in the preceding match were not recorded.

**Fastest debut goal?**

Elliot Bailey scored after 30 seconds of his first game for the club in the 4-2 defeat at Kings Langley in the Southern League Division One (Central) on 21<sup>st</sup> November 2015.

**Fastest Hat Trick?**

Damon Miles in eight minutes against Croydon in the Isthmian League Division Two on May 6<sup>th</sup>, 1995. Miles' goals came in the fifth, seventh and thirteenth minutes of a game eventually won by 3-2.

**Most penalties in a game?**

There were six penalties awarded in the Herts Senior Cup quarter final between Cheshunt and Ware on January 14<sup>th</sup> 2025, four for Cheshunt and two for Ware. In what was eventually a 7-4 win for Cheshunt. All but one for Cheshunt were converted successfully.

**Best goal scoring on debut:**

Mo Hibbert scored four on his debut in the Spartan League Division One (East) game at home to Harlow Town on 6<sup>th</sup> March 1948. Ware won 11-0

Bernie Skeggs scored four on his debut in the Athenian League Division Two game at home to Aylesbury United on 21<sup>st</sup> November 1964. Ware won 8-2.

**First player sin-binned:**

Geggs Awoyemi was sin binned in the Under-23 fixture at Bury Town on Monday, 9<sup>th</sup> September 2019. Sin bins or temporary dismissals for ten minutes had been introduced by the FA for all games up to Step 5. There was no explanation as to why the referee chose to sin-bin a player at this level.

2019/20 - Thirteen competitive games unbeaten from 17<sup>th</sup> August to 1<sup>st</sup> October inclusive covering eight wins and five draws with 39 goals scored and 19 conceded.

Ware went 2-0 up against Northwood in the first 63 seconds of the Isthmian League Division One (North) game played at Wodson Park on 8<sup>th</sup> December 2007. Chris Ellerbeck and Paul Burton were the scorers. Ellerbeck and Steve Horsey scored further goals in what was ultimately a 4-1 win.
